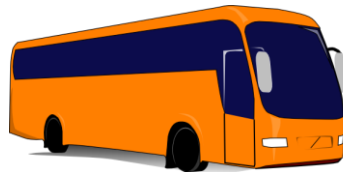

Based on *Alcestis*, the drama by Euripides, *Althea* turns the Greek tragedy into contemporary comedy, with some serious observations about faith and hypocrisy.

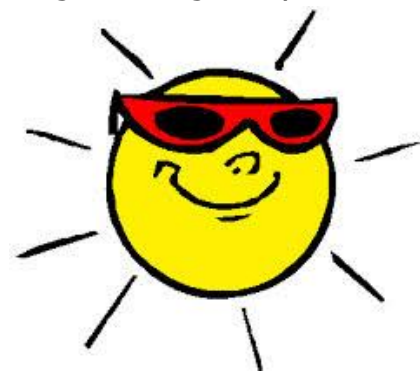
